STANDARDS FOR PROPER CARE OF SCHOOL ISSUED TECHNOLOGY

The EVSC takes great pride in utilizing technology to maximize student learning, which includes issuing students devices for use at home and school. Students are expected to follow all specific guidelines listed in this document and take any additional common-sense precautions to protect their assigned computer device.

Student Responsibilities

Both the student device and charger have been checked out to you.

- **Treat it well:** Take care of the computer like it is your own. Be gentle with it and keep it safe.
- **Keep it locked or with you:** Always lock the computer in your school locker or in a secure place where others cannot get to it. If you cannot lock it up, make sure to keep it with you and never let it out of your sight. If someone steals your computer when left unlocked or unattended, you will be responsible for the cost to replace the device.
- **Avoid risky situations:** Don't leave the computer in places like school vans, the gym, locker rooms, playing fields, or other places where it could get damaged or stolen. Also, do not keep it in a car unless you lock it in the trunk.
- **Do not let others use it:** If someone else uses your device and something happens to it, you will be responsible for fixing or replacing it.
- **Follow the school's rules:** Always follow the school's rules for using the computer. If you are not sure what you can do, ask a teacher, principal, or school support technician.

Remember, it is important to take good care of the computer because it belongs to the school, and it is there to help you with your learning.

How to Handle Technical Issues

- Tell the school support technician: If you have any problems with the computer or need it repaired, let the school support technician know right away. Do not wait!
- Report lost or stolen devices: If your computer gets lost or stolen, inform the school support technician immediately. They will lock the device so no one else can use it. If someone finds the device, they should return it to the school technician to unlock it.
- Ask for help: If you are not sure what to do or have any questions, do not hesitate to ask for help. The school support technician is there to assist you.

Remember, if the computer accidentally gets damaged, the school will take care of the repair costs. It is important to report any issues promptly so your school support technician can get it repaired and you can continue using the computer for your schoolwork.

General Care
